

ST. JOSEPH'S CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL
ADMISSION POLICY 2016 -2017

St Joseph's Primary School was founded by the Catholic Church to provide education for the children of Catholic families. The school is conducted by its Governing Body as part of the Catholic Church in accordance with its trust deed and instrument of government and seeks at all times to be a witness to Jesus Christ.

As a Catholic school, we aim to provide a Catholic education for all our pupils. At a Catholic school, Catholic doctrine and practice permeates every aspect of the school's activity. It is essential that the Catholic character of the school's education is fully supported by all families in the school. All applicants are therefore expected to give their full, unreserved and positive support for the aims and ethos of the school.

The Governing Body has sole responsibility for admissions to this school. The Governing Body intends to admit 90 pupils (Published Admission Number) to Reception in the school year which begins September 2016. Whenever there are more applications than places available, priority will always be given to Catholic applicants in accordance with the oversubscription criteria listed below.

Oversubscription Criteria

Where there are more applications than places the places will be offered in accordance with the following criteria and order of priority.

1. Catholic looked after children and Catholic children who have been adopted (or made subject of child arrangements orders or special guardianship orders) immediately following having been looked after.
2. Baptised Catholic children from practising Catholic families with a sibling attending St. Joseph's Primary School at the time of admission.
3. Baptised Catholic children of permanent teachers, where the staff member has been employed at the school for more than two years at the time of application.
4. Baptised Catholic Children from practising Catholic families who are resident in the parishes of Our Lady of Dolours or St. Patrick's West Hendon.
5. Baptised Catholic Children from practising Catholic families who are resident in the parish of St Edward the Confessor, Golders Green.
6. Baptised Catholic children from practising Catholic families who are siblings of former pupils of St. Joseph's Infant or Junior School.
7. Baptised Catholic Children of practising Catholic families who are resident in any other Catholic parishes.
8. Other baptised Catholic children.
9. Other looked after children and children who have been adopted (or made subject of child arrangements orders or special guardianship orders) immediately following having been looked after.
10. Members of the Eastern Christian churches.
11. Catechumens.
12. Christians of other denominations whose parents wish them to have a Catholic education and whose application is supported by a minister of religion.
13. Children of other faiths whose parents wish them to have a Catholic education and whose application is supported by a religious leader.
14. Any other applicants.

Where the offer of places to all the applicants in any of the categories listed above would lead to oversubscription the following provisions will be applied:

The Governing Body will give top priority to an application within a category where evidence is provided at the time of application of an exceptional social, medical, pastoral or other need of the child which can only be met at this school. Parents may request that their child be educated out of his/her chronological age group. Such requests must be made in writing to the Chair of Governors during the autumn term in the year of application i.e. Sept – Dec 2015 for children born between 01.09.11 – 31.08.12. Governors will consider each request on its own merits and permission will only be given in exceptional circumstances. When the application is made, it will be ranked with all the other applications and no further exceptions will be given.

A statutory right of appeal will be given upon refusal if no place has been offered in any school year. The deadline for submission of an appeal is 27th May 2016.

Tie Break

Where the offer of places to all the applicants in any of the sub-categories listed above would lead to oversubscription, the places up to the admission number will be offered to those living nearest to the school. Distance will be measured in a straight line from the front door of the child's home address to the main entrance of the school, using the council's computerised measuring system, with those living closer to the school receiving the higher priority. The home address is defined as the address at which the child resides for 50% or more of the school week.

Places can be withdrawn, even once offered, if it is found that the offer was made on the basis of false or contradictory information. When the oversubscription criteria are applied to applications made on behalf of twins or triplets, governors will admit the second twin/triplet even if this means going over the published admissions number.

Multiple Applications

Where the final place is offered to a child who has other siblings applying for a place in the same school year, these siblings will also be admitted.

Information about Applications in Previous Years

Last year the school was heavily oversubscribed. As the school is usually oversubscribed by Catholic candidates, it is very unlikely that a non-Catholic candidate will obtain a place.

Application Procedures and Timetable

To apply for a place at this school, you should complete both a Common Application Form from your Local Authority (either on line or by collecting a paper copy from the local authority) and return it to them by 15th January 2016. You should also complete a school Supplementary Information Form and return it to The Headteacher, St. Joseph's Primary School, Watford Way, Hendon, London, NW4 4TY by 5.00pm on 15th January 2016, in order to make a full application. If you don't complete and return both forms by this date your application will be classed as 'late' and not considered until all other applications have been processed.

Applicants applying under criteria 2 to 7 must submit a priests' reference form (PRF) by the closing date. This form is available from the school website www.stjps.org.

You will be advised of the outcome of your application on 18th April 2016, initially by a letter from your LA on our behalf. If you are unsuccessful you may ask us for the reasons, related to the oversubscription criteria listed above, and you have the right of appeal to an independent appeal panel.

Waiting Lists

In addition to their right of appeal, unsuccessful candidates will be offered the opportunity to be placed on a waiting list. This waiting list will be maintained in order of the oversubscription criteria set out above and not in the order in which applications are received or added to the list. The waiting list is maintained until the child reaches the end of key stage 2 (Year 6) or until parents inform us that they wish the applicant to be taken off the list.

Pupils with a Statement of Special Educational Needs/Education, Health & Care Plan (EHC)

The admission of pupils with a Statement of Special Educational Needs/Education, Health and Care Plan (EHC) is dealt with by a completely separate procedure. This procedure is integral to the making and maintaining Statements by the pupil's home Local Authority. Details of this separate procedure are set out in the *Special Educational Needs Code of Practice*.

In-Year Admissions

Applications for in-Year admissions are made directly to the school. When there is no waiting list the local authority will be notified and the child will be admitted. If more applications are received than there are places available, then applications will be ranked by the governing body in accordance with the oversubscription criteria. If a place cannot be offered at this time then you may ask us for the reasons and you will be informed of your right of appeal. You will be offered the opportunity of being placed on a waiting list. This waiting list will be maintained by the governing body in the order of the oversubscription criteria and not in the order in which the applications are received. When a place becomes available the governing body will decide who is at the top of the list and make an offer.

Fair Access

The school is committed to taking its fair share of children who are vulnerable and/or hard to place, as set out in locally agreed protocols. Accordingly, outside the normal admissions round, the Governing Body is empowered to give absolute priority to a child where admission is requested under any local protocol that has been agreed by both the local authority and the Diocese for the current school year. The Governing Body has this power even when admitting the child would mean exceeding the published admission number.

Reception Year Deferred Entry

Applicants may defer entry to school up until statutory school age i.e. the first day of term following the child's fifth birthday. Application is made in the usual way and then the deferral is requested. The place will then be held until the first day of the spring or summer term as applicable. Applicants may also request that their child attend part-time until statutory school age is reached. Entry may not be deferred beyond statutory school age or beyond the year of application. Parents of summer born children wishing to defer should note that the latest date for deferral is 1st April 2017.

Notes (these notes form part of the oversubscription criteria).

'Looked after'/'Child in care' has the same meaning as in section 22 of the Children Act 1989, and means any child in the care of a local authority or provided with accommodation by them (e.g. children with foster parents).

'Catholic' means a member of a Church in full communion with the See of Rome. This includes the Eastern Catholic Churches. This will normally be evidenced by a certificate of baptism in a Catholic Church or a certificate of reception into the full communion of the Catholic Church.

'Practising Catholic' means Catholic children from practising Catholic families who habitually worship at Mass on a weekly basis and where the application is supported by a Catholic priest. The governing body will expect this practice to be verified by a reference from a priest in the standard format laid down by the diocese.

'Catechumen' means a member of the catechumenate of a Catholic Church. This will normally be evidenced by a certificate of reception into the order of catechumens.

'Eastern Christian Church' includes Orthodox Churches, and is normally evidenced by a certificate of baptism or reception from the authorities of that Church.

'Parent' means the adult or adults with legal responsibility for the child.

'Sibling' means brother or sister, to include adopted brothers and sisters, half brothers and sisters or step brothers and sisters. A sibling relationship does not apply when the older child(ren) will leave before the younger one starts.

'Adopted'. An adopted child is any child who has been formally adopted and whose parent/ guardian can give proof of adoption.

'Child Arrangements Orders'. A child arrangements order is an order under the terms of the Children Act 1989 s.8 settling the arrangements to be made as to the person with whom the child is to live. Children 'looked after' immediately before the order is made qualify in this category.

'Special Guardianship Order'. A special guardianship order is an order under the terms of the Children Act 1989 s.14A appointing one or more individuals to be a child's special guardian(s). Children 'looked after' immediately before the order is made qualify in this category.
